These simulations are not designed to be easy; they will push the delegates into making difficult decisions in time-sensitive situations. Our crisis simulation software Conducttr, alongside out live in-house TV studio, allows us to deliver engaging, realistic and immersive content to our delegates. Future of Intelligence

11:00am AEST, Tuesday 14 September 2021

This panel will discuss the challenges that those working in the intelligence space may face in a fifteen-to-twenty-year window. How will analysts manage to sort through an everincreasing amount of data at open-source agencies such as ONI? Is it likely that cyberattacks in the future will be regarded as conventional attacks? This panel seeks to address these questions in discussion with a wise range of academic and industry experts.

Women and National Security

10:00am AEST, Thursday 16 September 2021



Update from our Technology Team

Even as the final pieces fall into place and the number of weekly meetings starts to increase, it's hard to believe that the 2021 Australian Crisis Simulation Summit is now less than a week away now. I'm proud to say that the team has been working above and beyond to deliver one of the most unique and innovative events in the national security landscape. One of the key highlights from the inaugural summit often mentioned by delegates, mentors and partners was the Summit Broadcasting Corporation (SBC), our live TV network that runs throughout each of the crisis simulations. The SBC provides delegates with an exciting, realistic, and immersive information feed to compliment the Conducttr software, featuring everything you would expect from a real news network: breaking news reports delivered by industry veteran journalists, live interviews with delegates and mentors, and pre-recorded news reports presented by journalists around the world. One of my goals this year was to redevelop the SBC into a fully in-house and student-run TV studio that we could collaboratively design and implement alongside the crisis writing teams. This has allowed us

The Technical Services team led by Jack Williams, is already hard at work setting up technical support resources for delegates and role players during the simulations. A comprehensive support page, troubleshooting guide, and a remote support system through Zoom are just a few of the things Jack and his team has been putting together to make this event run as smooth as possible.
